

POSTING FOR A TENURE-TRACK FACULTY POSITION IN INDIGENOUS INTERDISCIPLINARY STUDIES

The <u>School of Liberal Arts</u> in the <u>Faculty of Arts</u> at Laurentian University invites applications from suitably qualified candidates for a tenure-track position at the rank of Assistant Professor in <u>Indigenous Interdisciplinary Studies</u>. The preferred start date is August 1, 2024, and the position will remain open until filled.

This innovative program includes foundational courses on the Indigenous Peoples of Canada, a suite of Land-Based Anishnaabemowin Immersion courses, and various others in Indigenous rights, governance, histories, cultures, literatures, and creative expression. The ideal candidate will have the following qualifications:

- Indigenous (First Nations, Metis and Inuit) to Turtle Island with ties to their community.
- Comprehensive understanding of Indigenous worldviews and frameworks.
- Understanding of Indigenous (First Nations, Metis and Inuit) to Turtle Island culture and traditions including their importance within an Indigenous Studies framework.
- A Ph.D. in Indigenous Studies or another Liberal Arts field focused on Indigenous perspectives and communities OR equivalent qualifications and experience in their area(s) of expertise with demonstrated research/creative productivity and teaching experience.
- The ability to teach and develop courses contributing to Indigenous Interdisciplinary Studies programs within the School of Liberal Arts, in accordance with the candidate's particular areas of expertise and experience.
- Evidence of the ability to teach effectively at the undergraduate level with a commitment to pedagogical and academic excellence, promoting a safe, inclusive, and welcoming learning environment, and advancing Laurentian University's tricultural mandate.
- Evidence of strong scholarly activity which may include creative work.
- Commitment to equity, diversity, and inclusion, promoting a vibrant academic and work environment.

Actively engaging in teaching and research, the successful candidate will establish a strong presence on campus, contributing to the School, Faculty, University, and broader community. The candidate will teach in-person as well as advance student learning in curriculum design and program oversight, all within a collegial environment.

Application Requirements

- A cover letter (including one of the two statements about citizenship/resident status specified below)
- An up-to-date Curriculum Vitae.
- A statement of current and prospective teaching experience and interests
- A statement of current and prospective research interests
- Self-identification as First Nations, Métis or Inuit*
- The names and contact information for three academic references.

Applicants need not identify their country of origin or citizenship; however, all applicants must include one of the following statements: "I am a Canadian citizen/permanent resident of Canada"; OR, "I am not a Canadian citizen/permanent resident of Canada" in their cover letter. Applications that do not include this information will be deemed incomplete.

* First Nations, Métis and Inuit Verification will be required for applicants who advance to the interview process (certificate of Indian Status, federally recognized Métis organization in Canada, and/or verification from an Inuit organization/community); or letter of explanation if one cannot be provided.
